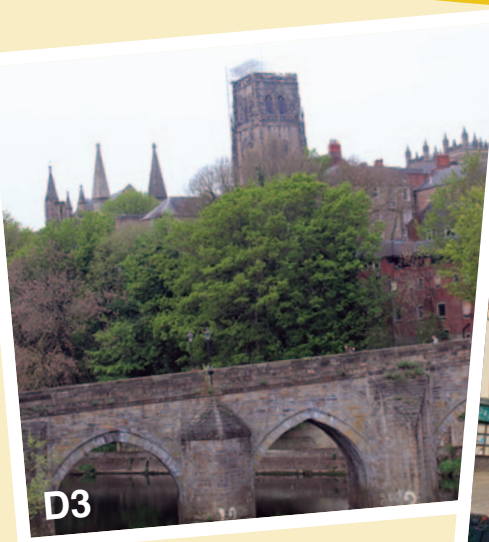

So our final fundraiser, the BIG dinner 2, is now underway. Please support us in any way you can!

It might be easiest for you simply to make a donation - see how on our [website](#). Or you could raise money for us in some other way.

But our last fundraiser is called the BIG dinner 2 because people enjoyed the original BIG dinner in 2015, and with the loosening of Coronavirus restrictions, you might enjoy hosting a BIG dinner 2 event for family, friends, your neighbours or maybe with your Inner Wheel club. There is no set format or date for your fundraiser. You just need some good company and great food, and to ask your guests to make a donation to 500 miles instead of bringing the usual chocolates and flowers.

Morning coffee, cocktails and canapes, or a formal dinner party, it's up to you. You'll find lots of recipes and cooking tips from some people you may recognise on our [Recipes and Tips page](#).

Our target of £262,500 is equal to the cost of an average device for 1,500 people who can't afford to pay for one - but just £18 buys a shoe raise and £55 a new foot, both simple devices that enable someone to walk. Every penny received goes into providing our service, so please give whatever you can to help us handover our clinic so that Malawi can deliver this service itself.

Margaretta Golding Award

On Friday, 20 August, members of Edgbaston Convention Inner Wheel, District 6, were very proud to finally present Lyn Ankcorn with her Margaretta Golding Award - almost four months to the day after we did this virtually by Zoom at our Club's 35th Birthday celebration, and almost two months since our second attempt in June (both delayed because of Covid).

Lyn received the award in recognition of her involvement with the management of Birmingham Crisis Centre for over thirty years, providing a safe place for women and children suffering domestic abuse.

Because Lyn's husband John was not well, Lyn invited members of our club, her family and friends to her home for afternoon tea, which was laid out in her lovely garden.

In 1981 John realised that Birmingham desperately needed a safe place for women and children suffering from domestic abuse, and after a temporary venue was found for the original refuge, John undertook the huge challenge of getting a purpose built Centre, which was opened by Princess Anne in 1987. It is staffed 24/7 and has 24 units for mothers and children, a nursery, communal areas, and a laundry. Practical and emotional support is given and legal advice is available. The staff continue to support families when they move into their independent accommodation.

From the very beginning Lyn gave John her full support, and they both gave their time voluntarily to ensure the success of this demanding undertaking. Lyn was also working part time as a physiotherapist and caring for their three young sons, the youngest with special needs. She has continued her involvement with the management of the Centre ever since. She is a warm, caring and determined lady and very modest about her enormous contribution to the success of the Centre.

Lyn was truly touched to receive this award and said she would display the framed certificate at Birmingham Crisis Centre. Some years ago John had received an MBE for his involvement with the project, but as Lyn said, many people receive an MBE, but only nine people internationally have received a Margaretta Golding Award this year!

Global Sight Solutions



Global Sight Solutions was registered with the charity commission back in the 90's by members of Guildford Rotary Club, the aim being to work with Rotary Clubs in the developing world and together establish financially sustainable eye hospitals, free to the world's poorest. It has to date had considerable success.

Over 50 hospitals have been opened in India with others either already established, or in the throes of opening their doors, in Bangladesh, Pakistan, The Lebanon, Kenya, Uganda and Nigeria.

There are estimated to be as many as 650 million poor, with sight problems worldwide, all in desperate need of help. Global Sight Solutions currently prioritises the provision of cataract operations to the 50 million poor in need of this service while continuing to provide a full range of eye care to others.

Via the wonders of Rotary's Global Grants a sight restoring cataract operation can be provided for a donation of just £5 in the UK. Using the same Grant facility a new hospital can be equipped with both surgical and assessment/diagnosis equipment for a total of 'only' £12,000 from UK donors.

Current targets: Five new eye hospitals each year. Create a minimum capacity of 180,000 cataract operations p a by 2026.

Giving hope of a Better life through Education...

Worldwide, orphans and children of desperately poor families are denied an education, not only due to their circumstance, but because they are also 'out of sight and therefore out of mind'. UNICEF believe that whatever a child's circumstance, an education is their right.

Literacy in a Box recognised the need in 2004 and since 2006 has sent over 1000 Literacy Boxes, filled with the basic resources needed for teachers to deliver primary education. Zambian schools are currently our main focus.

One school we support in Zambia, among the 40+ others, is Jedidah Learning Steps which has a high proportion of orphaned pupils. Please visit our website www.literacyboxtrust.org.uk to see how Literacy Boxes are helping them.

Literacy Boxes have helped orphans and poverty affected children enrol in schools. The paper, pencils and other basics have enabled teachers to give their pupils a more complete education. It costs £350 to send a Literacy Box to Zambia and give 25 Zambian children a foothold on that vital educational process that could lead to a better life.



UK children have a ready and ongoing access to all the basic educational materials needed by teachers to deliver their education, so we fill the Literacy Box with equivalent quality materials. We send them as regularly as donations allow, as we strive to offer the same for the Zambian children. However, the scale of the task is immense.

There are more than 100,000 strokes a year in the UK and stroke is the leading cause of complex disability. Stroke can strike anyone, at any time, including young people and babies.

The Stroke Association believe everybody deserves to live the best life they can after stroke. They provide specialist support, fund critical research and campaign to make sure that everyone affected by stroke gets the very best care and support to rebuild their lives.

Stroke Helpline

One of the ways your fundraising helps is by supporting the Stroke Helpline. The Stroke Helpline offers confidential information, guidance and support to anyone affected by stroke. All enquiries are answered by professional, trained staff who have an understanding of stroke and how it changes lives. You can call if you want to know more about stroke and its effects, what happens after a stroke, or what help and support is available. Or you might simply want someone to talk to.

The Helpline team offer balanced, up-to-date information and if they can't answer your question they will research it or direct you to other sources of support.

Last year the Helpline handled over 18,000 enquiries, including questions about coronavirus and stroke.
